Course Description:

This class is an introduction to journalism and mass communication. We will focus on the media of mass communication, on theories and processes of communication and mass communication and the political, economic and cultural roles of media in society. We will address diversity, such as thought, race or culture, as part of the regular material.

Grading: Your grade is based on the scores you receive on unannounced quizzes and announced exams. There will be a total of 200 questions asked on quizzes and exams. The lowest exam and quiz score will each be dropped.

Bring pencils to each class in case a pop quiz or exam is held. I will not have extra pencils on hand.

I reserve the right to add or subtract points for students whose participation is exceptionally beneficial or detrimental to the class.

UWS 14.03 Academic misconduct subject to disciplinary action.

- (1) Academic misconduct is an act in which a student:
 - (a) Seeks to claim credit for the work or efforts of another without authorization or citation;
 - (b) Uses unauthorized materials or fabricated data in any academic exercise;
 - (c) Forges or falsifies academic documents or records;
 - (d) Intentionally impedes or damages the academic work of others;
 - (e) Engages in conduct aimed at making false representation of a student's academic performance; or student's academic performance; or
 - (f) Assists other students in any of these acts.
- (2) Examples of academic misconduct include, but are not limited to: cheating on an examination; collaborating with others in work to be presented, contrary to the stated rules of the course; submitting a paper or assignment as one's own work when a part or all of the a paper or assignment as one's own work when a part or all of the paper or assignment is the work of another; submitting a paper or
