Journalism Core (12)

Distribution (9)

REQUIRED 9 units (crs) by completing three courses.

- Only one of the two courses, 312 or 341, will count toward the 9 units (crs). A course taken as a Distribution requirement does not count again toward the 9 credits in the Emphasis requirements or the 6 credits in the Electives requirements.

- Students may declare multiple emphases to be a journalism major. However, journalism accreditation and department policy specify that journalism majors must earn 80 units (crs.) in courses outside of journalism and mass communications. Those standards also require that 65 of those units (crs.) must be in the liberal arts. Taking more than 36 journalism credits might delay your graduation timeline.

*The Internship (427) course will not count toward the 36 credits needed for the journalism major.

**Magazine Editing (325) and Online Publishing (451) appear in multiple emphases because of their interdisciplinary approach.

Electives (6)

REQUIRED 6 units (crs) from the list.

At least 3 of the 6 units (crs) must be taken outside of your emphasis. Classes already taken from the Distribution and Emphasis requirements do not count again as Electives.

REMINDERS

- Maximum of three journalism classes per semester. (Interim courses are not included.)
- Must receive a "C" or higher in all prerequisite journalism classes. (141, 211, 221, 224, 239, 250, 315, 327, 331, 339, 351, 353)
- Need to take 141 (Intro to Journalism) and receive a "C" or higher to get into 300-and 400-level journalism classes.
- An overall 2.50 grade point average (GPA) required based on transcripts from all accredited colleges attended.
- Must earn 80 credits in courses outside journalism and mass communication, and 65 of those credits must be in the liberal arts.
- Consult the Undergraduate Bulletin for a complete list of those courses that will not count toward the 80-credit requirement. Most of the courses are in Art or Radio-TV-Film.
- Students may have trouble meeting the non-journalism and liberal arts credit requirements if they minor in Communication (specifically Radio-TV-Film), unless they are willing to significantly extend their college careers, and for this reason the Department urges students to think carefully about such a minor.
- Non-journalism internship credits/courses are not considered to be liberal arts credits.
- Students required to follow: First Day Attendance Policy A student who does not attend class on the first day forfeits that slot. The student's name will be officially removed from the class roster by the faculty. The student may re-enroll to gain entrance if the slot has not been filled.
Early Drop Policy A student who drops Writing for the Media (221) or Editing (224) after the first meeting of the class interferes with the department's efforts to assist all students in completing their journalism studies in a timely fashion. To discourage students from dropping 221 or 224, the department imposes a one-semester penalty for the courses. In other words, students who drop 221 or 224 will have to wait one additional semester before re-enrolling in that course.
