Course Description

This class is an introduction to mass communication and mass media. This class will focus on the development and impact of journalism and mass media. You will study the institution, history, economics, and social role of each major medium, including traditional and new media. You also will study mass communication theories and the regulations and social effects of mass media.

Course Objectives

1. Students will gain an understanding of journalism and mass communication at the macro and micro levels.
2. Students will obtain a broad knowledge of the developments, operations, impacts, and economics of mass media.
3. Students will develop an awareness of the trend of converging media in terms of the applications and the potentials.

Required Reading

1. The Dynamics of Mass Communications: Media in the Digital Age, 10th Edition, by Joseph R. Dominick.
2. In addition to the required textbook, your instructor will distribute handouts of articles that are pertinent to the course throughout the semester. Students are responsible for this material on quizzes and exams.

Exams (85%)

There are four exams in this class, 100 points per each. The lowest exam score will be dropped. The top three exam scores count toward the final grade. The exams **cannot** be made up in cases of absence, except for students who have scheduled UW-O activities that take them away from campus. If you will be away from campus due to UW-O activities, please provide the documentation ahead of time to get my approval. Absence due to illness does not qualify someone for a make-up exam. Make-ups are not allowed for family emergencies, personal emergencies, etc., unless otherwise defined as acceptable by the university. If you are late, you may not enter the exam/quiz area if someone has already left the room.

The format-of questions will be multiple choice and true/false. The material on the exam will cover any class discussions, notes, handouts, and textbook readings. The total of your exam scores will be the average of your top three exam scores multiplied by 85 percent.

Quizzes (15%)

There will be four unannounced quizzes during the course, 5 points per each. The lowest quiz score will be dropped. The quizzes will cover recent readings and/or lectures. Quizzes **cannot** be made up in cases of absence or tardiness. Your total of your quiz scores will be the sum of your top three quiz scores.

Reading Assignments

Students are responsible for read the assigned materials prior to the class meetings.
