

About the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh

- Third largest of the 13 state-supported universities comprising the University of Wisconsin System.
- Enrolls about 1,200 graduate students out of a total student body of about 13,500.
- Accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA).
- With a population of more than 65,000, the city of Oshkosh is consistently ranked among the top small cities in the nation.

Graduate program faculty and services

Financial assistance

- Graduate assistantships are available to eligible students each year.
- The Advanced Opportunity Program offers funds to students of color and non-minority disadvantaged students.
- Scholarships may be available through various colleges and graduate departments.
- Loans and employment are available through the Office of Financial Aid.
- International students are eligible to apply for both graduate assistantships and state of Wisconsin nonresident partial tuition remissions.

Non-degree students

- Persons with a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution may take coursework as a graduate special student for professional advancement or enrichment without being admitted to a degree program.
- Enrollment in courses is subject to availability and/or approval.

Minimum admission requirements

Admission in full standing to a master's degree program requires the applicant to meet minimum Graduate Studies requirements:

- A bachelor's degree from a **regionally** accredited institution.
- An undergraduate grade point average of at least 2.75 (4.00 scale) or at least 2.90 during the last half (approximately 60 credits) of undergraduate work.
- Submission of *official* transcripts of all collegiate work.
- Submission of a completed on-line application and payment of a non-refundable \$56 application fee
- GRE, GMAT or MAT score. (only if required by program)

Many programs have additional admission requirements such as letters of recommendation, test scores, written personal statements and other requirements. Refer to www.uwosh.edu/gradstudies, the program website or contact the Graduate Studies office for more information.

Admissions Requirements

Students must have a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited university in any discipline and a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.0.

No GRE or other entrance exam is required.

Program

Focus on financial, social and environmental management in this 12-course online master's program. Students will learn about the foundations of sustainability and will apply sustainability to economics, management, law, policy, and ethics.

Specialty track courses include resource management, renewable energy, corporate social responsibility, and supply chain management.

This online master's program is a collaborative effort of five University of Wisconsin System campuses: UW-Green Bay, UW-Parkside, UW-Stout, UW-Superior and UW Oshkosh. Students in the master's program choose a "home" campus. The degree is completed entirely online, and no campus visits are required.

A relevant, cutting-edge curriculum has been developed by faculty from each of these five campuses. Input from industry advisors ensures our learning objectives are up-to-date and valuable to current and future employers.

Degree requirements

The 12-course master's program consists of the core curriculum (twenty four credits), a specialty track of the student's selection (four credits), and a capstone experience (four credits), which is typically taken during the final two semesters.
