AMNESTY

WHAT IS TITLE IX?

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 is a federal civil rights law that protects individuals from discrimination based on sex, in any educational program or activity operated by recipients receiving federal financial assistance. This protection includes gender identity/expression and sexual orientation. Sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual exploitation and stalking are forms of sexual misconduct prohibited by Title IX and University policy. Sexual misconduct can have the effect of denying individuals equal access to, and benefit from, University programs and activities. UW Oshkosh prohibits all forms of discrimination and/or sexual misconduct on all three campuses — Oshkosh, Fond du Lac and Fox Cities — and in all programs and activities.

PROHIBITION AGAINST RETALIATION

Prohibited retaliation includes intimidation, threats, coercion or discrimination against any individual for the purpose of interfering with any right or privilege secured by law or policy or because the individual has made a report or complaint, testified, assisted or participated or refused to participate in any manner in an investigation, proceeding or hearing.

- Dating violence
- Domestic violence
- Providing false information to a reporting or investigatory office on a Title IX matter
- Refusal to comply with a reasonable request on a Title IX matter
- Retaliation
- Sexual assault
- Sexual exploitation
- Sexual harassment
- Stalking

CONSENT

Consent is words or overt actions by a person who is competent to give informed consent, indicating a freely given agreement to engage in sexual activity or other activity referenced in law or University policy. A person is unable to give consent if they are incapacitated because of drugs, alcohol, physical or intellectual disability, or unconsciousness (UWS-17).

REPORTING OPTIONS

1. Report to the University using the online reporting form on the Title IX website.



2. Report to UWO Police Department at (920) 424-1212.
3. Report to local law enforcement.
4. Report anonymously on the Clery Crime Reporting Form at uwosh.edu/police. This form is reserved for students, University guests, confidential resources and parents/guardians only.

PRESERVING EVIDENCE

Evidence of sexual misconduct should be preserved as soon as possible, even if you are unsure about reporting to the University or law enforcement. Evidence can include text messages, social media posts, photos, bedding, clothing, etc. Bedding and clothing should be kept in paper or cloth bags to best preserve any evidence.
